Quick Response Units Transporting Patients

Introduction

The North Dakota EMS Association (NDEMSA) recognizes that licensed ambulance services in North Dakota have faced numerous struggles to continue operating in a sustainable manner. These challenges have resulted in some ambulance services decreasing their licensure level to Quick Response Units (QRU) or ceasing operation altogether. Given the geographical challenges that face responders in North Dakota, to include extended transport times to local and tertiary centers, as well as limited availability of advanced life support resources, there has been a focus on innovative solutions to maintain emergency care to rural North Dakota. One question that has been presented at a variety of venues is "Why can't QRU's transport patients to the point of intercept?"

Background

The intent of the Quick Response Unit licensure was to provide, within the local response system, a unit capable of delivering emergency response personnel to the scene of a traumatic or medical emergency to provide initial assessment and treatment of life-threatening emergencies. QRU's are typically placed in areas where providing a fully equipped ambulance is not feasible or sustainable.

North Dakota Century Code governing ambulance services explicitly limits QRU's from routinely transporting patients. Specific criteria must be met as defined in 33-11-1.1-11 of the North Dakota Administrative Code for a QRU to initiate transport of a patient. Within that criteria, the primary care attendant must be an Emergency Medical Technician.

There are no vehicle requirements set forth within the Administration Rules governing Quick Response Unit vehicles, therefore the vehicles can range from personal automobiles to marked SUVs to ambulance chassis' that have been retained after the service changed licensure level. The rules also set requirements for minimal equipment which must be present on the vehicle and there is no requirement for patient care documentation.¹

Discussion

It would not be appropriate to allow QRU's to transport patients to the point of intercept with a licensed ambulance service within the governance currently in place for the following reasons:

- 1. Only one person is required to respond and that individual must be trained at the EMR level. As a national standard, EMT's are required to transport patients.
- 2. There are no vehicle requirements set forth in the statue. Therefore, there is no way to ensure that a QRU has a vehicle capable of safely transporting patients. In addition, no initial or ongoing inspection requirements exist to assure the public that the vehicle is maintained properly.
- 3. The minimal equipment list set forth for QRU's does not contain a stretcher, or other equipment necessary for safely securing and transporting patients.
- 4. QRU's are not required to complete patient care reports.

For the reasons listed above, there would need to be multiple changes made to current Century Code and/ or Administrative Rules to allow QRU's to safely transport patients. The rules that would be required would closely resemble the existing sub-station model currently defined in 33-11-01.2 of the North Dakota Administrative Code.

Quick Response Units are not able to obtain reimbursement for transports because they are not a licensed ambulance service.² Furthermore, QRU's are often not qualified for grant funding or funding from the local tax base as they are not a licensed ambulance. The reimbursement, grant, and tax monies are all directed to the associated ambulance service of the QRU. Therefore, given the added costs needed for the operation and maintenance of a vehicle that is capable of safely transporting patients, and the limited funding sources available for the QRU, the associated ambulance

service would have to bear the increased operating costs. This would likely further erode the sustainability of the EMS System.

The majority of life-saving interventions occur in the first minutes of arrival to a patient. This includes opening the airway, defibrillation, high-quality CPR, bleeding control, narcan or epinephrine administration, etc. Transportation of the patient rarely makes the difference between life and death. The "Golden Hour" is often cited as the reason for rapid transport. However, this is not evidence-based and, in fact, saving minutes of time in the trauma victim in the prehospital setting rarely improves survival for a patient who needs several hours of surgery once they reach the hospital.³ Another scenario is a patient in cardiac arrest. These patients are critical and require high-quality CPR and defibrillation. If the focus is on getting the patient loaded for transport, rather than on high-quality CPR, the patient will not survive.

Getting trained first responders to the scene of an emergency is the highest importance, and especially for the QRUs. Although transport is a vital component of the EMS system, it is of secondary importance to the initial response.

Summary

The North Dakota EMS Association supports the development of a strong EMS system that is capable of delivering the highest quality care to the citizens we serve. Creating a system that is not stable, reliable, and sustainable is not in the best interest of the profession, citizens, or providers. The framework already exists for transporting patients through ambulance licensure and substations. Creating a separate licensure level of QRU's capable of transporting does not support a sustainable and reliable EMS system.

Furthermore, the North Dakota EMS Association supports a model of emergency response personnel responding directly to the scene of an emergency, rather than responding to a designated emergency vehicle prior to initiating response to the emergency. This is especially true in a QRU model, and we recommend ambulance services respond with a fragmented crew when appropriate for ambulance response, as outlined in 33-11-01.2-16 of the North Dakota Administrative Code.

Written Call Schedule Requirement

Introduction

North Dakota ambulance services are required to maintain a written call schedule for each day to indicate the qualified responders who are "on duty" for that day. In the past, services handled receiving a call in a variety of ways. This included sounding the civil defense or "tornado" sirens, using a phone calling tree, or ringing a fire bell. With those methods, and even with the advent of modern equipment like pagers, when the alarm was raised, every member of the service who could would respond. Once at the ambulance garage, they would decide who, if not all of them, would take the call. This has led to issues where everyone assumed someone else was responding and thus, no one did. The reaction from dispatch centers is to then sound the alarm again, which leads to delayed response times. Anecdotally, we hear that the requirement for a written call schedule has led to some qualified emergency responders quitting due to the commitment this requires.

Background

North Dakota Administrative Code 33-11-01.2-09 requires ambulance services to "maintain a file that identifies at least two qualified ambulance service personnel on a written call schedule." This rule was established in 2008 to address the issue of ambulance services not responding to calls and no one being accountable for that response.

Discussion

The rule requires "at least two" qualified individuals be on the schedule at any given time. If more than the required number wish to commit to responding or to just respond to the ambulance when the call comes in, that is allowed within the rule. However, those service members who have been listed as "on duty" for that day would have a legal duty to act and would be held accountable if a call for service went unanswered.

Ambulance services have a duty to act when summoned for an emergency. When service leaders (whether managers, supervisors or boards of directors) do not clearly indicate who is responsible to respond to calls, they keep that accountability (and legal liability) to themselves while not assuring the community they serve that someone will respond.


Summary

The North Dakota EMS Association does not support the elimination of the requirement for a written call schedule.

Ambulance services have a duty to act when summoned for an emergency response. When there are not clear answers to the questions posed above, it is impossible to have accountability to ensure the ambulance service does, in fact, respond to their duty.

We support a strong EMS system in North Dakota – which requires a proactive approach to ensure reliable response to the citizens and visitors of North Dakota.

On January 19-20, 2019 the NW Region EMS Conference was held in Minot at the Grand Hotel. As part of a Friday evening pre-conference event, Trinity Health sponsored Mr. D. Troy Tuke, RN, NREMT-P, of the Clark County Fire Department, Las Vegas, NV to come to Minot to speak on the events following the Las Vegas Shooting. ND EMS Instructor Update - Recertification (No CEUs)

Presenters: North Dakota EMS Educators

This 8 hour session meets the biannual requirement of continuing education for licensed Instructor Coordinators. Topics that will be covered include an update from the ND EMS Division, EMT Portfolio/Scenario Testing Project Roll-out, and moulage techniques. This course is NOT for initial Instructor/Coordinator certification.

NCCR Education Sessions

8:30 AM-6:00 PM Emergency Vehicle Driver Training (0.5 NCCR Ambulance Safety, Remaining LCCR) (Limit 25)

Presenter: Sanford Health EMS Education

Driving an emergency vehicle is a privilege and a position of responsibility. Participants in this course will have the opportunity to gain and/or verify a broad range of competencies associated with emergency vehicle driving. These competencies include basic understanding of emergency vehicle operations as well as the skills necessary for practical application. This course consists of classroom, along with hands-on driving on a controlled course. Classroom will be 0830-1400 and the driving portion will be 1400-1800. Topics covered will include: identifying the problems in emergency vehicle operations, motivating the emergency vehicle operator to perform professionally, legal aspects of emergency vehicle operations, physical forces acting upon the vehicle, performing vehicle inspection and maintenance, and legal and regulatory requirements of Standard Operating Guidelines (SOG). This course has been approved as an Insurance Premium Reduction Course by the North Dakota Highway Patrol.

8:00 AM-10:00 AM Adult Stroke and Adult Urosepsis (1.0 NCCR Stroke, 0.5 NCCR Infectious Diseases, 0.5 LCCR) (Limit 20)

Presenter: Simulation in Motion ND

In <u>Adult Stroke</u>, learners will practice assessing and providing treatment or transport of a patient. Topics will include identifying stroke assessment tools, oxygen administration, knowing the timeline of a stroke, and transportation.

In <u>Adult Urosepsis</u>, learners will practice assessing and identifying sepsis. Topics will include scene safety, transfer of a patient, transmissions of the influenza virus occurs and assessing differences between sepsis and septic shock.

8:00 AM-10:00 AM Geriatrics Hands-On Lab (2.0 LCCR) (Limit 25)

Geriatrics are a population that is increasing and is often not understood and poorly treated by EMS, mainly due to a lack of knowledge. 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
